A. Mining the Ordinary

EVERYTHING is fair game for a story. Grocery store aisles, broken toys, newspaper headlines, and even (especially?) obituaries are fertile grounds to grow ideas. During this session, we'll generate quick poetry/prose starts and create characters based on everyday items. The ordinary may inspire extraordinary pieces.

B. Variations on a Theme: Multigenre Writing
